How time flies. I am now entering my fifth year as Town Clerk and I am very proud that the Town Council has moved on so far in such a short space of time. When I started in post in 2012 the Town Council operated from rented accommodation at West Street, had no events programme, and contributed little to the development of the towns greenspaces. During the last five years, the Town Council have developed a new town hall that has had just over 62,000 visits since its opening in May 2014 to the end on March 2017, and made significant improvements to the towns greenspace, such as a new building at Eaton Street Park and progressive works to the strategic development and enhancement of Brown's Field through its master plan. Prescott also boasts one of the most active events programs in the region, with the Town Council responsible for four events through the year and also contributing financially to another three including the Elizabethan Fayre, Prescott Festival and Phoenix Night.

Unfortunately continued financial pressures limit the scope of progress, however both myself and the staff at the Town Council remain undaunted, and will make every effort to continue to move forward in the future. Who knows what the next five years will hold?

Shakespeare North Playhouse

It's an exciting time for Prescot . . .

as ambitious plans to create a world - class Shakespearean Playhouse in the town are moving at pace. Shakespeare North Trust has been working on plans for a theatre in Prescot for more than 12 years, due to the town's significant role in the history of Elizabethan drama.

Even Hollywood actress, Dame Judi Dench has written about her passion for Shakespeare and her support for the new Playhouse in Prescot!

Now with support from Knowsley Council, great progress is being made to take this from a dream into reality.

Since plans for the Playhouse were approved in April 2016, key appointments have been made for the lead architect, engineering services, archaeologist and lead artist for the project. Knowsley Council has submitted a bid to the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority for £6.5m funding towards the £26m construction costs and this bid has been given the green light to go through to the next stage.

The Government has already supported the project by providing £5m of funding, which has been confirmed by Arts Council England and Knowsley Council itself has invested £6m into this exciting project.

Construction of the Playhouse is expected to start in January 2018 and it is due to be completed in May 2020.

Shakespeare's links with Prescott

Shakespeare wrote for a troupe of players called Strange's Men, who took their name from their sponsor, Ferdinando Stanley, Lord Strange, who was to become the Fifth Earl of Derby.

Strange's Men had also performed at Knowsley Hall in Prescott: their home base.

The story of Shakespeare, Strange's Men, the Earls of Derby and the people of Prescott and Knowsley are interwoven at this point. Some of Shakespeare's plays are believed to have been written to honor his patron, including Richard III, Titus Andronicus, The Taming of the Shrew and Love's Labour's Lost. A Midsummer Night's Dream may have been written to mark the wedding of the Sixth Earl of Derby, William.

Those who lived at Knowsley Hall were not the only ones to reap the benefits. A few miles away on the edge of the estate's deer park, in the market town of Prescott, the first Elizabethan indoor theatre in Britain outside London, was built. This structure, a hugely significant development in the evolution of drama, was simply called The Playhouse.

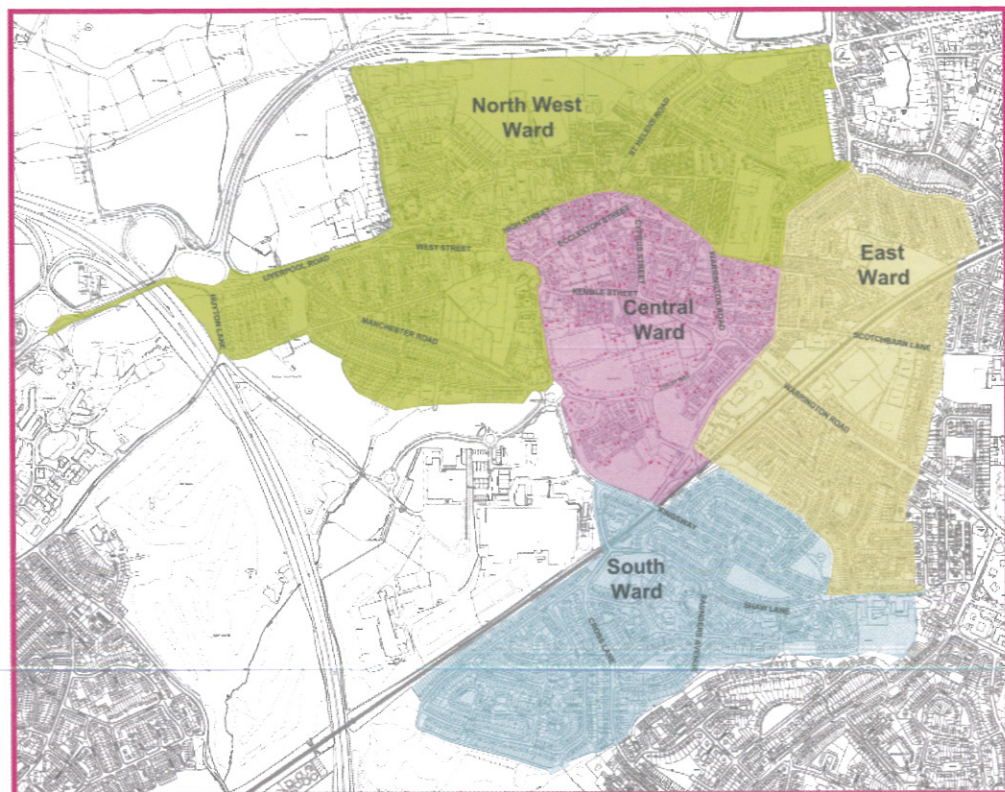
The new Shakespeare North Playhouse will stand just metres

from the original site of this theatre. As well as being an exciting space to perform plays, the centre will be a magnet for students from all over the world hoping to study Shakespeare and his work. Benefits to Knowsley Whilst recognising Prescott's rich heritage, the development is expected to have a multitude of benefits for the town and the wider area. It is estimated that the theatre and community education centre will deliver more than £10m worth of value to the local economy, as well as 210 construction jobs and 57 full-time jobs once the facility opens. It will attract over 150,000 visitors per year to Prescott helping to create a thriving evening economy in the town centre through increased footfall.

Prescot Town Council Annual Financial Report

The Town Council are well aware of the financial pressures faced by our residents and have therefore worked extremely hard not to increase the precept over the last six years. The policy of the previous administration was to increase the precept year on year and as such the precept saw incremental rises with a cumulative effect of 18% or £11.68 over the four-year period 2006/7 to 2010/11. Relentless public sector funding cuts such as the scrapping of Council Tax Benefit support to the Town Council have seen it lose just over £45,000 of funding in the last 4 years. In addition to this the Town Council have taken on additional services from KMBC at a cost of around £27,000 per year. Further known funding cuts for next year and the cost of transferred services mean that the cumulative financial pressures facing the council will rise to just over £96,000 since 2012/13. The sustained nature of the cuts has meant that after six years we must now put an increase on the Precept. The total increase of £7.23 per year per band D property can also be expressed as 14 pence per household per week, however as much of our town's housing stock is below band D this rise could be as little as £4.82 per year or 9 pence per week. This increase will raise approximately £20,000 helping to offset the income lost through the cuts and will enable Prescot Town Council to continue to deliver a high-quality service to residents.

Each year the Town Council's accounts are prepared by the Town Clerk and scrutinised by both an Internal and External audit, to ensure they comply with current legislation.

- The organisations project or activities are of clear benefit to the residents of Prescot

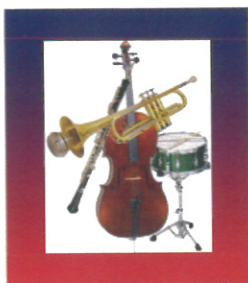

The Mayor of Prescot's Charity Christmas Concert in December attracted over 420 people and raised over £1,000 for local charitable causes. The excellent Brassworks Quintet headlined the programme, with audience favourites such as Eye of the Tiger and We Wish You a Merry Christmas. Also featured were the talented school choirs of St Mary & St Paul's Primary and Evelyn Community Primary, plus the Evelyn Staff Choir. Knowsley Ladies' Choir and Prescot Parish Church Choir also added to the festive entertainment.

The 13th Annual Prescot Festival of Music & the Arts showcased brass and military bands, an orchestra, choirs and jazz musicians between 16th and 25th June. Among this year's highlights was a stunning opening night courtesy of Leyland Band and a jubilant finale by the Band of the Yorkshire Regiment.

The 10-day programme also included a moving performance of Rutter's Requiem, a 40th anniversary screening of the 1977 BBC film *Our Day Out*, and a stunning recital by Festival Patron, Prof Dr Ian Tracey. The Chilled Lemons Jazz Quintet with vocalist Chris James wowed the audiences at the start of the final weekend before the Phoenix Concert Orchestra took the audience on a magical journey to Broadway and beyond!

Public Open Space

The Town Council believes that Public Open Space is very important to the health and wellbeing of the Township, therefore the Council seeks to make the most of its public open space by

constantly looking at ways to develop the spaces for the benefit of our residents. This often involves applying for external funding in partnership with Friends Groups and Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council. Prescott Town Council lease two Public Open Spaces from Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council; King George V Playing Fields, known locally as Browns Field and Eaton Street Recreation Ground. In addition to our two parks Prescott Churchyard and Cemetery located between Manchester Road and St Mary's Church also offers a tranquil setting for a quiet stroll.

League Bowling returns to Eaton Street

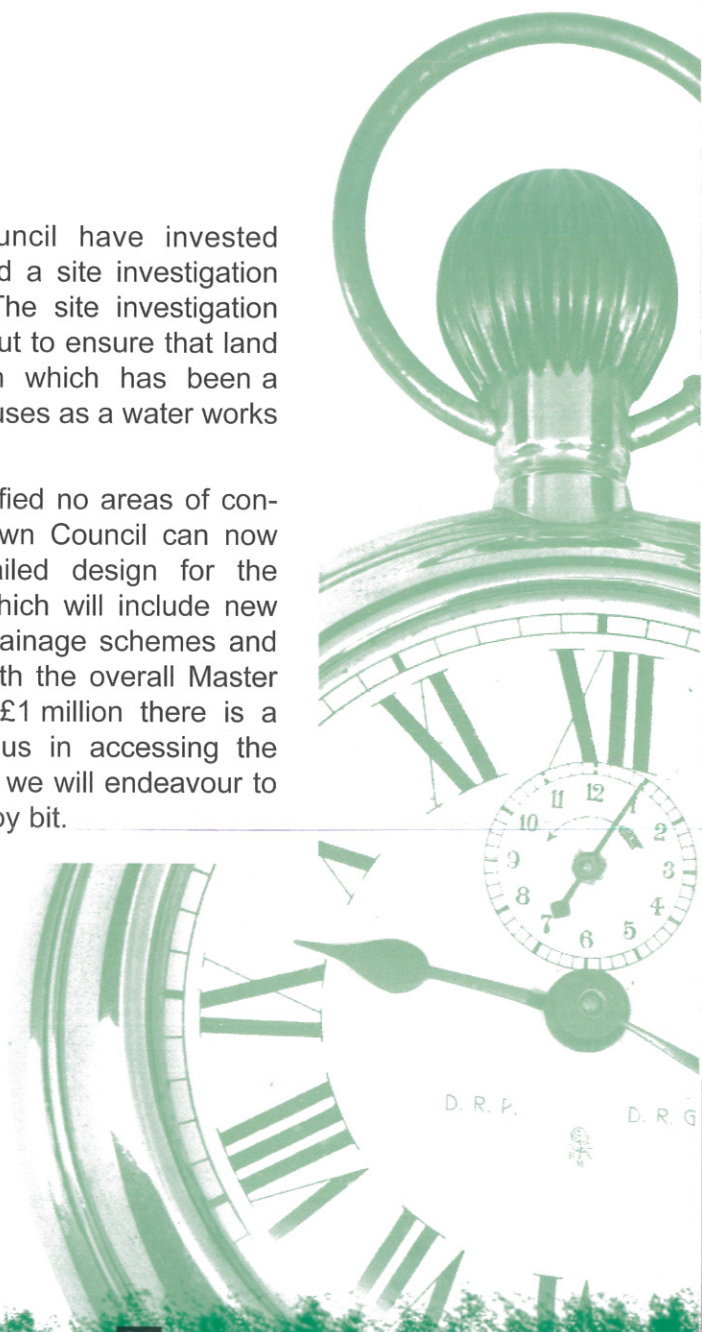
Following the installation of the new Pavilion Building the Town Council were contacted by Prescott Ladies bowling club. A Ladies team of local residents that have relocated back to Prescott from KGV Huyton. Browns Field

This year the Town Council have invested £10,000 and commissioned a site investigation report on Browns Field. The site investigation report has been carried out to ensure that land is free from contamination which has been a concern given its previous uses as a water works and allotment site.

Thankfully the report identified no areas of considerable concern. The Town Council can now begin to develop a detailed design for the development of the site which will include new changing facilities, pitch drainage schemes and footpath improvements. With the overall Master plan estimated at costing £1 million there is a significant task ahead of us in accessing the required funding. However, we will endeavour to realise the master plan bit by bit.
