Whilst the Town Council welcome the regeneration of brown field sites within the Town it would like to formally object to the proposed development on the following

grounds.

Highways Safety: The development of the site is already causing highways issues with vehicles parking along Oliver Lyme Road inhibiting normal traffic. The proposed parking is far from adequate.

Lost of Light: The introduction of a '4 story building' along Oliver Lyme Road will completely change the nature of the road effectively introducing a new building the same size as the old industrial building (being the watch factory on Albany Rd) to an area of the road where no such building has previously been present. This would certainly reduce amount of light to those properties on

## Tinling Close.

Visual Amenity: The Watch Factory is a grade two listed building and as such provides aesthetic value. The idea of covering this building with a modern building completely detracts from the aesthetic of the grade two listed building behind. Prescot is currently embracing its phenomenal history through the development of Shakespeare North, public realm works, Shop frontages through the heritage lottery initiative etc. This building does not help to preserve the Town's history or identity in any way, and is out of place.
